




Message from Father Paul

On the Celebration of Halloween

Like me, you have probably heard many versions of the relationship between Halloween and the church. As Halloween falls on a Sunday this year, it is important to have a clear understanding of the origin and purpose of All Hallows Eve in our church. The following article was written a couple of decades ago, but I have faithfully saved it to read every year as Halloween approaches.

The Custom of celebrating the feast of "All Hallow" or " All Saints" Eve is a tradition going back to at least the 9th century AD. It began as the autumn-time Christian feast day in the Celtic Christian church of Ireland and Britain, taking the place of an ancient pagan harvest feast. It has long been the feast day in the western Christian Church for remembering the communion of saints - those of every generation who have gone before us; those saints in our midst today; and all of the faithful who will come after us.

The "Eve" or evening before the feast day of All Hallows came to be known as Halloween or the eve (een) of All Hallows. In the evening before the great feast day, the people would come together in church to ask for God's blessing and protection from evil in the world and to seek strength and courage to live out the gospel. Some of the people would dress as evil spirits, thus depicting the battle between good and evil in the world. Late at night, the people would go to the church cemetery for a service of remembrance for the saints (the baptized) who had gone before them in life and death. A great "bone" fire of All Hallows eve would be lit and the bones of the poor who had died during the previous year for whom there were no grave sites would be thrown into the fire. From the word "bone" fire comes our term "bonfire".


Halloween is a traditional Christian feast day, not just some recent "hallmark" holiday or some commercial fall festival or even the devil's night. It is a feast day of the church and certainly not a night for "tricks" or anything harmful to people or property. It is an evening before All Saint's Day when we give thanks for all the saints of every generation who have battled evil in order to strengthen our faith in Jesus Christ.

Sunday, October 3: *Confronting Evil*

The ancient city of Beth Shemesh stood like a guardhouse over the Sorek valley, which was often a battleground between the Philistines and Israelites. The Philistines controlled the area for many years, until God prepared a Nazirite named Samson to confront the evil culture of the Philistines.

Sunday, October 10: *Iron of Culture*

The city of Azekah was another strategically important city in the Israelites struggles with the Philistines. It was near Azekah that the Philistines sent their mighty warrior, Goliath to fight the one appointed by God to face him – a young shepherd boy named David.

Sunday, October 17: *In the Shadow of Herod*

Beginning with this lesson, our focus will be the land and the culture in which Jesus lived. Herod the Great was king of Israel when Jesus was born. He was ruthless and powerful and remembered for and his relentless suppression of all resistance. Herod was also known for his magnificent building programs, of which the most extravagantly spectacular was the Herodion complex. The Herodion included 45 acres of buildings on 200 acres of palace grounds. Built on a high hill, the Herodion literally cast a shadow across the landscape of Israel's history and people.

Sunday, October 24: *My Rock and My Fortress*

The ruins of Masada, another one of Herod the Great's spectacular fortress-palaces, stand high above the Dead Sea in the mountainous Judea Wilderness. He intended it to be a refuge in case he ever had to flee Jerusalem. Ironically, it was used by about 1,000 Jewish Zealots to escape the Roman's destruction of Jerusalem around AD 70.

Sunday, October 31: *The Time had Fully Come*

In 1947, Bedouins discovered the ancient Dead Sea Scrolls that had been hidden in caves surrounding the Essene community of Qumran. The scrolls provided new insights into the theological beliefs and expectations of people who lived during Jesus' time. This lesson will examine the faith and practices of the Essene community.

Trunk or Treat

It is another way for children to go trick or treating in a safe environment and a way for our church members to celebrate Halloween together in a unique way. Participants will bring their cars to the church and back up into a designated parking space so the trunk of the car is facing the sidewalk. The trunk is opened, decorated for Halloween, and bowls of candy are placed inside. If you don't want to decorate your car, bring a small table and decorate it to hold the bowls of candy. Kids walk from vehicle to vehicle, collecting candy the way they would from house to house.

The event runs from 5 to 7p.m. Plan on arriving by 4:30 to get your spot and set everything up. Don't forget your lawn chairs. If you plan on joining the fun, please notify the church office, so we know how many spaces to make available.

We currently have over 50 men and women in our facility. According to the VA, close to 100,000 veterans, both men and women, are currently homeless in America. They go on to tell us that 1.5 million are on the verge of becoming homeless. We are working to make as big of a dent in the homeless numbers and working toward helping those who are at the verge of being homeless, through temporary housing, counseling, and case management." An Old Man and a Bucket of Shrimp

It happened every Friday evening, almost without fail, when the sun resembled a giant orange and was starting to dip into the blue ocean.

Old Ed came strolling along the beach to his favorite pier.

Clutched in his bony hand was a bucket of shrimp. Ed walks out to the end of the pier, where it seems he almost has the world to himself. The glow of the sun is a golden bronze now.

Everybody's gone, except for a few joggers on the beach. Standing out on the end of the pier, Ed is alone with his thoughts...and his bucket of shrimp.

Before long, however, he is no longer alone. Up in the sky a thousand white dots come screeching and squawking, winging their way toward that lanky frame standing there on the end of the pier.

Before long, dozens of seagulls have enveloped him, their wings fluttering and flapping wildly. Ed stands there tossing shrimp to the hungry birds. As he does, if you listen closely, you can hear him say with a smile, 'Thank you. Thank you.'

In a few short minutes the bucket is empty. But Ed doesn't leave. He stands there lost in thought, as though transported to another time and place.

When he finally turns around and begins to walk back toward the beach, a few of the birds hop along the pier with him until he gets to the stairs, and then they, too, fly away. And old Ed quietly makes his way down to the end of the beach and on home.

If you were sitting there on the pier with your fishing line in the water, Ed might seem like ‘a funny old duck,’ as my dad used to say. Or, to onlookers, he’s just another old codger, lost in his own weird world, feeding the seagulls with a bucket full of shrimp. To the onlooker, rituals can look either very strange or very empty. They can seem altogether unimportantmaybe even a lot of nonsense. Old folks often do strange things, at least in the eyes of Boomers and Millennials. Most of them would probably write Old Ed off, down there in Florida... That’s too bad. They’d do well to know him better. His full name: Eddie Rickenbacker. He was a famous hero in World War I, and then he was in WWII. On one of his flying missions across the Pacific, he and his seven-member crew went down. Miraculously, all of the men survived, crawled out of their plane, and climbed into a life raft. Captain Rickenbacker and his crew floated for days on the rough waters of the Pacific. They fought the sun. They fought sharks. Most of all, they fought hunger and thirst. By the eighth day their rations ran out. No food. No water. They were far from land and no one knew where they were or even if they were alive. Every day across America millions wondered and prayed that Eddie Rickenbacker might somehow be found alive. The men adrift needed a miracle. That afternoon they had a simple devotional service and prayed for a miracle. They tried to nap. Eddie leaned back and pulled his military cap over his nose. Time dragged on. All he could hear was the slap of the waves against the raft. Suddenly Eddie felt something land on the top of his cap. It was a seagull! Old Ed would later describe how he sat perfectly still, planning his next move. With a flash of his hand and a squawk from the gull, he managed to grab it and wring its neck. He tore the feathers off, and he and his starving crew made a meal of it – a very slight meal for eight men. Then they used the intestines for bait. With it, they caught fish, which gave them food and more bait....and the cycle continued. With that simple survival technique, they were able to endure the rigors of the sea until they were found and rescued after 24 days at sea. Eddie Rickenbacker lived many years beyond that ordeal, but he never forgot the sacrifice of that first life-saving seagull. And he never stopped saying, ‘Thank you.’ That’s why almost every Friday night he would walk to the end of the pier with a bucket full of shrimp and a heart full of gratitude.
