



## The Bells of St. Mary's



Former Bishop of the Diocese of Texas, the Rt. Rev. Don Wimberly, foresaw troubled times ahead. Like many bishops, he knew that the budgets as well as the sizes of many congregations in small towns and rural areas were shrinking. He charged his staff with developing the means to train both bi-vocational priests and vocational deacons. Both ordained roles had been the means in other dioceses to advance God's mission in the world and serve parishes. Bishop Wimberly knew it was time for the vast and diverse Diocese of Texas to look into these leadership options as three-year residential seminary training grew more out of reach for many parishes and those called to ordained ministry.

In 2004, the Diocese of Texas opened the Iona School for Ministry to train bi-vocational priests and vocational deacons. Bi-vocational priests are those ordained to the priesthood who will serve small, underfunded parishes while working a full-time job in a secular environment or are retired. Vocational deacons are those individuals called to a "servant's ministry," working under the direction of their bishop and oftentimes focused on the needs of the poor and needy in their community. Meeting monthly for ten months each year, Iona students undergo an intense three-year period of academic study and vocational preparation. In 2016, a "lay" track was added to Iona which allows individuals not called into one of the ordination tracks to study in a theological environment to prepare for a deeper commitment to lay ministry in the church.

Late this summer, St. Mary's was asked by leadership of the Iona School for Ministry to be a training site for bi-vocational priests. With the enthusiastic support of your vestry, we agreed to take a student this academic year. On [September 23](#), Bill Bullard from St. Mark's, Bay City, will join us in ministry, fulfilling an Iona requirement to perform field work in a parish during his last year in Iona. Bill will join us most Sundays, filling in various roles when he is not at Camp Allen one weekend each month for his coursework.

I urge you to welcome Bill in our midst. We have been asked to assist him in gaining experience in the spectrum of priestly ministerial responsibilities. I ask your permission in advance to allow me to bring Bill into a variety of ministerial opportunities this year, whether it be tasks like teaching or accompanying me on pastoral visits.

In response to this request from the Iona School, one of your vestry members declared, "The mustard seed is already germinating!" Let's continue to be a blessing to others, starting with Bill!

## Fall 2018 Christian Formation

What we have been longing for at St. Mary's is finally here. The beginning of Christian Formation for all ages will be Sunday, September 9th, after hospitality. The Rector will lead the adults on topics related to "Life in Christ - Life in Community". They will meet in the Parish Hall. The youth under the guidance of Miss Colleen will meet in the youth room at the top of the stairs. They will be using the Episcopal based curriculum "Weaving God's Promise" as well as other resources relevant to the youth of **today**. Godly Play for our younger parishioners will take place in the Godly Play room as the children are guided by Miss Dani on their spiritual quest.

The Wednesday evening Christian Formation for St. Mary's youth and children will begin on **September 12th** at 5:30. This time may change depending on the activities of our youth. Just as we did last year, a meal will be served first along with a chance for fellowship. The children and youth will then be divided into 2 groups with Miss Shyanne leading the pre-school through 5th grade group and Miss Colleen guiding the youth. Miss Dani will also be available to assist both groups.

If you would like to provide a meal for the **Wednesday** evening Christian Formation groups, please sign up on the sheet in the Parish Hall. The meal does not need to be elaborate. Plan on between 12 and 15 people.



## The Blessing of the Animals

The Episcopal Church, like its mother church, the Church of England, has always shown a certain ambivalence to the feast days of saints. Some parishes have always recognized and faithfully honored the saints of the Church, while other parishes gave scant attention.

One saint who has always received attention across Christian denominations has been St. Francis of Assisi. During Francis' lifetime, he was primarily known for his deep identification with the poverty and suffering of Christ. He and his followers lived by a strict rule of poverty. But even within his lifetime, stories began to surface of Francis' almost mystical connection to creation, particularly animals. Stories abound of Francis preaching to birds and befriending rabbits and crickets.

St. Mary's will honor the feast day of Francis of Assisi on the **first Sunday in October, October 7<sup>th</sup>** at 4:30, with a Blessing of the Animals. We will gather on the lawn, share a short liturgy, and then Rev. Sharron will move from pet-to-pet and animal-to-animal brought for a blessing. The youth and children of St. Mary's will operate a lemonade stand, proceeds of which will go to the local pound. Once all animals have been blessed, we will invite all members and guests to join us for a pot-luck dinner with the Brotherhood of St. Andrew cooking hot dogs for all! Please be sure to sign up to bring a side dish...and invite your friends and neighbors!



## Commissioning Ceremonies

Commissioning is to charge someone with a task, giving them authority to do something in an official capacity. Two commissioning ceremonies were held at St. Mary's. On **August 12th**, Sharron commissioned the Christian Formation teachers and aides with the task of "leading those whom they teach to the knowledge and love" of God through their word and example.

The worship leaders: acolytes, organist, those who administer the sacraments, altar guild, usher captain, ushers, and lectors, were commissioned on Sunday, **August 26th**. Both individuals and groups were given the task to serve God with love, reverence, devotion, and holiness. Please keep these people in your prayers as they perform their service to God and St. Mary's.



## Ink

With the increase in programs and pew bulletins, the inclusion of hymns outside the 1982 Hymnal, the addition to our services, the desire to make our worship more meaningful so it can reach more people and their needs, St. Mary's is now using more printer ink. To help with the cost, we are part of Office Depot's Ink Cartridge Recycle Program. Each month, we can turn in up to ten used ink cartridges for a credit of \$2 per cartridge. This allows us to save \$20 a month on new ink. To aid with this ongoing recycling program, please donate any used ink cartridges to the church. All brands and types are welcomed, including refurbished ink. There will be a container for them in the Parish Hall. Thank you for helping defray the cost of ink and also for helping the environment by recycling.

# Honoring Our Military



For Veteran's Day, we traditionally honor those military personnel for whom our parish prays each **Sunday** by sending them a gift card and notes to thank them for their service and let them know they are in our prayers. A basket will be set out in the narthex from July to November for donations. You can give weekly, monthly, or make one donation. Any amount would be greatly appreciated by these 9 men and their families. Last year we donated \$419.58. By November, we will need the current addresses for these military personnel. If you know this information or have a military person you would like included in the Prayers of the People each **Sunday**, please let Dani know.

## Donations for the Military

In our parish hall there is a container by the door for donations to the US Troops Not Forgotten. This organization supports all military branches and sends packages throughout the year to our service personnel overseas. Each month specific items will be listed to purchase. The items for September are: paperback books, magazines, toilet paper, individual drink packets, small peanut and sunflower seed packets, Ramen Noodles, and Slim Jims. They will also accept cash donations to help with mailing expenses.

Preheat your oven and don your aprons because the center is looking for volunteers that can provide four 13x9 baked cakes each **Monday** morning from October through December. ## News from the Vestry

The vestry met Monday, [August 27th](#).

### ***Rector Report: The Reverend Sharron Cox***

Sharron gave the rector report detailing her activities from [July 20th](#) to [August 21st](#). She met with the West Columbia Elementary 5th grade teachers concerning the Discovery Program. The vestry approved her proposal to join West Columbia First United Methodist Church in distributing [Thanksgiving](#) Baskets. The congregation present at the August parish dinner approved the new logo with the tag line "The Mustard Seed Church". The vestry approved a request from The Iona School for Ministry that St. Mary's be a mentor site for one of their third-year students.

### ***Senior Warden's Report: Karen Logue***

Karen gave a report on Stewardship in general and made specific suggestions for St. Mary's. She and Sharron are finalizing the Fall Stewardship Campaign for St. Mary's. She also reported the need for a mission statement and vision statement. The Community Assistance Committee is surveying local churches to learn their policies on helping people in the community.

### ***Junior Warden's Report: Andrea Anderson***

Andrea was not present, but Sharron was able to give her report. There was some air conditioning work done this month. The vestry discussed the need for improvements on the parking lot and upgrading the fire alarm system.
